DOCTORAL OR PROFESSIONAL DEGREE

Jobs in demand: physical therapists, family physicians, dentists and pharmacists.

MASTER'S DEGREE

\$49,672 **\$62,714** **\$79,695**

Jobs in demand: physician assistants, occupational therapists, nurse practitioners and speech-language pathologists.

BACHELOR'S DEGREE

\$43,519 **\$55,115** **\$70,229**

Jobs in demand: construction managers, cost estimators, registered nurses and environmental engineers.

ASSOCIATE DEGREE

\$38,555 **\$47,135** **\$57,762**

Jobs in demand: dental hygienists, radiologic technologists, electrical engineering technologists and physical therapist assistants.

SOME COLLEGE, NO DEGREE

\$34,702 **\$42,758** **\$52,970**

Jobs in demand: bookkeeping clerks, computer user support specialists, computer/office machine repairers and order clerks.

HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA OR EQUIVALENT

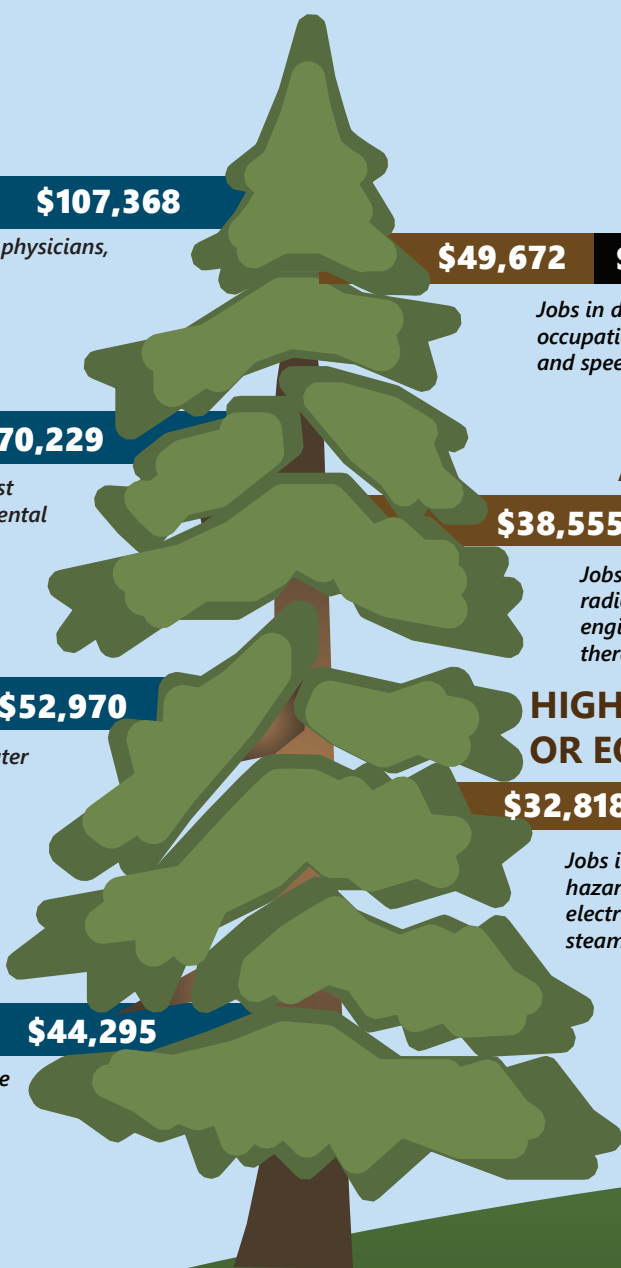
\$32,818 **\$39,764** **\$48,235**

LESS THAN HIGH SCHOOL

IDAHO'S WAGES BY EDUCATION LEVEL:

- **Entry** - 25% of workers with this education make this amount or less hourly, 75% make more.
- **Experienced** - Half of workers with this education make more and half make less hourly.
- **Advanced** - 25% of workers with this education make this amount or more hourly, 75% less.
