

About the Book

Booper the dog loves watching the stars at night. The stars make him feel brave, like he can do anything. He's determined to help build a new satellite so everyone can see the stars and feel brave like he does. In this book, students will learn that with hard work and the right support system, dreams can become a reality.

Purpose of the Book

"Booper Dreams Big" is part of the Idaho Department of Labor's efforts to expand awareness of apprenticeship as a valuable career pathway that can empower individuals and transform industries.

What is an Apprenticeship?

A Registered Apprenticeship is a structured training program that equips employees with the knowledge and abilities they need to succeed in a particular occupation. It provides businesses with skilled staff who meet their unique needs and is recognized by the United States Department of Labor. Registered Apprenticeships combine on-the-job training and classroom instruction to ensure trainees deeply understand their profession.

Similar to college, apprentices will receive a nationally recognized credential to work in their field of study upon completing the program. With an "earn while you learn" structure, apprentices are paid throughout their training and receive wage increases as they become more skilled. There are many job opportunities that can be achieved through apprenticeship, including nursing and healthcare assistance, electrical grid maintenance, plumbing, construction, HVAC system maintenance, information technology and countless others. An apprenticeship is a great opportunity for anyone looking for high-quality post-secondary education outside of a college or university.

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
Student Activities

We have created various resources and activities to accompany this book. Browse the available materials and choose the one(s) that best fit your classroom and/or student needs.


- Coloring Pages: Students will color preselected images from the story "Booper Dreams Big."
